5 Why's

Five whys (or **5 whys**) is an <u>iterative</u> interrogative <u>technique</u> used to explore the <u>cause-and-effect</u> relationships underlying a particular problem. The primary goal of the technique is to determine the <u>root cause</u> of a <u>defect</u> or problem by repeating the question "Why?".

Each answer forms the basis of the next question. The "five" in the name derives from an anecdotal observation on the number of iterations needed to resolve the problem.







Clean Fuels Fund

Proposal Writing Tips and Tricks!

Read and re-read the funding criteria!

Make sure you are familiar with the funder's mandate, priorities & criteria, and ensure your project fits within their framework.



Don't be afraid to pick up the phone and ask the funder what they are looking for – some may even look at a draft and agree to give you some high-level feedback!



What makes your proposal unique and stand out from the other proposals?





If feasible, consider including things in addition to what's required: do you have photos or a video of a previous project phase or related project, or a summary of the community's goals and vision, letters of support, or stories related to the project that you can include?



- Be clear, concise and specific when writing your proposal. Use examples to illustrate concepts; avoid using jargony-language or acronyms that may not be familiar to the funder.
- You are the expert on your project and community, so the funder needs to be able to understand what you are proposing.

Whenever possible, link to any other existing plan, vision, and goals.



Be realistic about timelines and deliverables (to avoid overpromising and underdelivering).





Tips and Tricks – budget specific!

- Make sure you know maximum funding guidelines on specific budget line items
- Always add in-kind expenses
- Be careful about including ongoing salary commitments vs. project management fees
- Do research to get accurate costs
- Make sure expenditures and revenues balance
- Leverage other funds





Save every proposal ever written in a separate folder, to copy and paste useful and transferrable background paragraphs, objectives, etc.



Have someone else edit your draft proposal – Fresh eyes are always useful!



If you hire a consultant to draft proposal, make sure you have a preplanning session n to avoid a cookie-cutter proposal and to ensure your community's story and priorities are accurately reflected.
