Topic Overview

- Denni Clement from ʔaq'am and Ktuxana Nation spoke to what conversations about climate change may look like within communities. Amanda spoke of her work with the BC Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy, and Kari shared a scientific and statistical analysis of climate change trends.

Key Learnings

- While the individual presentations were quite information heavy, the key learnings really emerged in the closing discussion and the closing circle. When using CCP and its steps in discussions about climate change, feelings in the room can be positive, negative, or a mix of both within a group. This session was a heavy one to participate in in some regards, and was uplifting and inspiring in others.
- CCP is a great tool to help navigate the challenging (and dynamic) relationships that individualism and/or communities may have with a changing climate and a current climate emergency.
- Indigenous communities who have been on the land since time immemorial are being disproportionately affected by something that is the result of colonialism. Indigenous voices are essential in the fight around climate change, but Indigenous folks should not be “relied on” to provide solutions or things like traditional knowledges.
